RESOLUTION ISSUING A NEGATIVE DECLARATION OF ENVIRONMENTAL SIGNIFICANCE WITH RESPECT TO THE PROPOSED ABOVEGRID BINGHAMTON SOLAR PROJECT AT THE GREATER BINGHAMTON AIRPORT

WHEREAS, Broome County, by Resolution 156 of 2022, declared Lead Agency status in the Environmental Review with respect to the proposed Abovegrid Binghamton Solar Project at the Greater Binghamton Airport, and

WHEREAS, this is a Type 1 Action pursuant to the New York State Environmental Review Act (SEQRA) which requires review, and

WHEREAS, Broome County notified all involved agencies to begin the coordinated review process and sent a copy of Part 1 of the FEAF, and

WHEREAS, Parts 2 and 3 of FEAF were completed by Broome County to determine the environmental impacts, and

WHEREAS, a Full Environmental Assessment, attached as Exhibit "A", has been conducted and it has been determined that there will be no significant adverse impact on the environment resulting from the proposed project, now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that this County Legislature hereby finds that the adoption of the proposed Abovegrid Binghamton Solar Project at the Greater Binghamton Airport will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts and hereby issues a SEQRA Negative Declaration of Environmental Significance upon the above entitled Action.




