RESOLUTION ISSUING A NEGATIVE DECLARATION OF ENVIRONMENTAL SIGNIFICANCE WITH RESPECT TO THE PROPOSED ABOVEGRID BINGHAMTON SOLAR PROJECT AT THE GREATER BINGHAMTON AIRPORT

WHEREAS, Broome County, by Resolution 156 of 2022, declared Lead Agency status in the Environmental Review with respect to the proposed Abovegrid Binghamton Solar Project at the Greater Binghamton Airport, and

WHEREAS, this is a Type 1 Action pursuant to the New York State Environmental Review Act (SEQRA) which requires review, and

WHEREAS, Broome County notified all involved agencies to begin the coordinated review process and sent a copy of Part 1 of the FEAF, and

WHEREAS, Parts 2 and 3 of FEAF were completed by Broome County to determine the environmental impacts, and

WHEREAS, a Full Environmental Assessment, attached as Exhibit "A", has been conducted and it has been determined that there will be no significant adverse impact on the environment resulting from the proposed project, now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that this County Legislature hereby finds that the adoption of the proposed Abovegrid Binghamton Solar Project at the Greater Binghamton Airport will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts and hereby issues a SEQRA Negative Declaration of Environmental Significance upon the above entitled Action.

Brief Description of Proposed Action (include purpose or need): The applicant is proposing a 5 mW AC solar system. The proposed solar array is a ground mount single-axis tracker 55-degree tilt system and 45 acres are being leased from Broome County. The proposed construction will also include the construction of a new gravel access road within the proposed solar array area, post-driven racking, inverter/transformer equipment pads, new below ground and overhead utility lines, and perimeter fencing. No significant grade changes are proposed. Post-construction vegetation management within the solar array footprint would be accomplished by mowing 2-3 times per year. At the end of its performance life cycle, the solar array system will be decommissioned and the site is to be restored to current field conditions.

During the Lead Agency's assessment the following potential impacts were identified and explored:

- Action may involve construction on, or physical alteration of the land surface of the proposed site - Erosion impacts due to physical disturbance or vegetation removal during construction or increase in impervious ground cover (total 0.40 acres impervious surfaces). A Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) will be developed and a permit will be issued by the NYSDEC prior to construction.

- Action may affect one or more wetlands or other surface water bodies - Review of the National Wetlands Inventory showed two potential wetland areas including the Little Choconut Creek tributary. The applicant is waiting for an updated wetlands delineation report to determine what, if any, impacts to wetlands will occur. The applicant will consult with the US Army Corps of Engineers and obtain any required approvals/permits prior to construction.

- The proposed action may result in the loss of flora or fauna

– The Monarch Butterfly was identified as a candidate species within the area by the US Fish and Wildlife Service. As a candidate species, there are no legal regulations for the monarch butterfly under the Endangered Species Act.

– The action requires conversion of more than 10 acres of forest (22.04 total acres as indicated on Part 1 of the EAF). The project site is adjacent to the airport development and there are other areas with similar conditions located on the project parcel. The project site is zoned industrial which is consistent with this use. Therefore, impacts to local species due to habitat fragmentation are not expected.

- The proposed action may occur wholly or partially within, or substantially contiguous to, an archaeological site not included on the NY SHPO inventory.- The applicant completed a Phase 1A Cultural Resources Assessment which determined the entire project site has high archaeological sensitivity and a Phase 1B assessment was recommended. The applicant will complete the assessment prior to construction in accordance with the standards of the New York Archaeological Council, adopted by the NYS SHPO and any cultural resources uncovered will be managed in a manner that meets NYAC standards.

Considering this assessment we have determined that there will be no significant adverse impacts on the environment resulting from the proposed project.

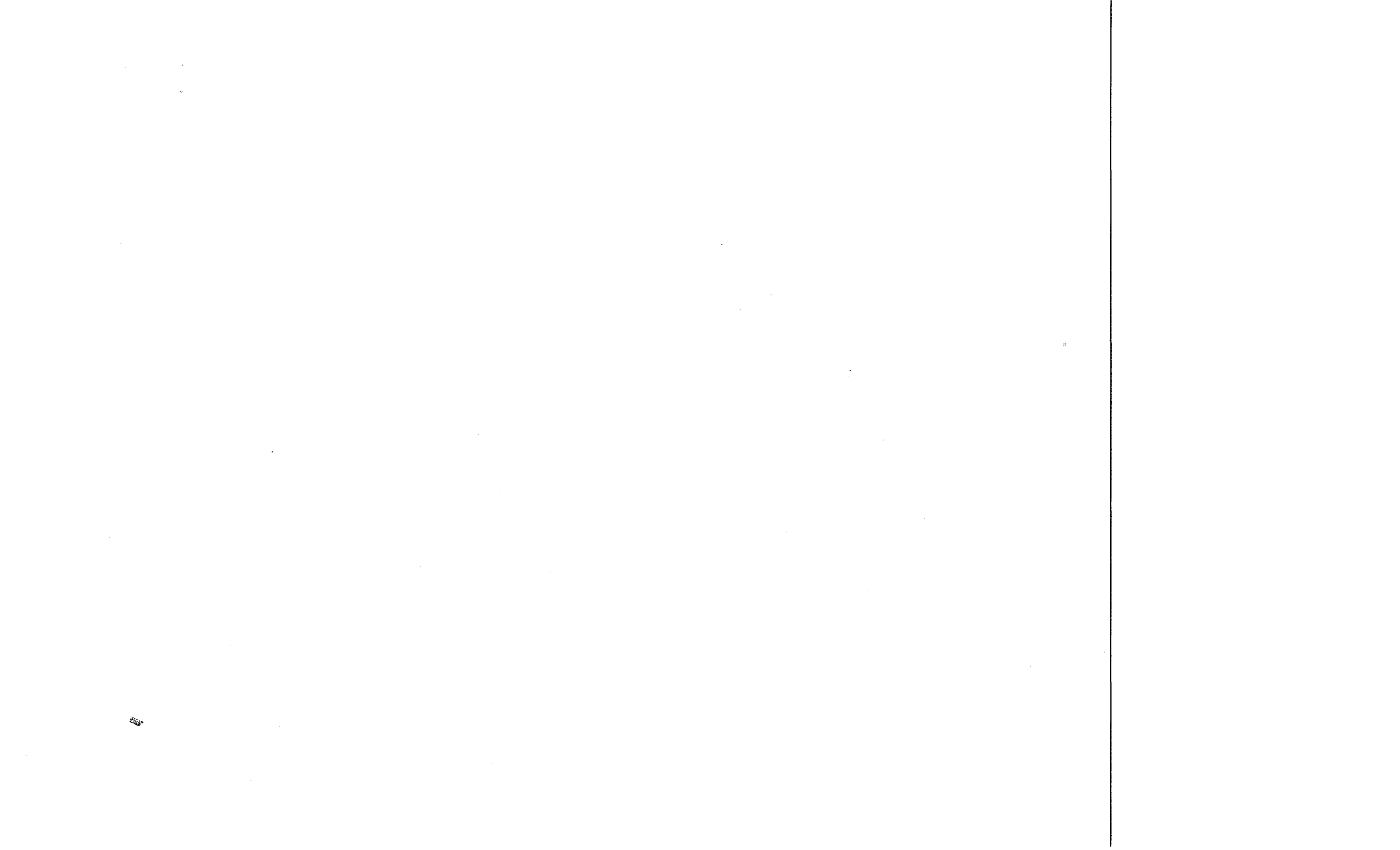
