





#### LAW ENFORCEMENT CHAIN OF COMMAND



During the calendar year 2024, the Patrol Division handled 31,231 calls for service which was an increase of 3,675 calls from the 2023 total of 27,556 and an increase of 4,047 from the 2021 total of 27,184. The following pages set forth a breakdown of these calls for service and the arrests made by the deputies.





The following graph represents the total number of calls for service by month that were handled by members of the Patrol Division.



Calls for police service vary in the type of response that is dictated. Some calls are of an extreme emergency nature while others can be handled by the officer "sometime during their tour of duty". Still others require prompt attention but do not meet the criteria for an emergency response.

- 1. EMERGENCY CALLS generally mean the type of call that requires immediate response due to personal injury, substantial public inconvenience or the fact that another person has been placed in jeopardy of serious physical injury and which is likely to occur if police assistance is delayed in any manner; priority 1 response.
- 2. ROUTINE CALLS generally mean those calls which have little or no chance for personal injury or harm to any person or little potential for causing substantial public inconvenience; priority 2 and 3 response.


#### JURISDICTIONAL BREAKDOWN










#### STRATEGIC RESPONSE GROUP



In June of 2024, Sheriff Fred Akshar joined Broome County Executive Jason Garnar, Broome County Legislature Chairman Dan Reynolds and members of the Broome County Legislature to announce the activation of the BCSO's full-time Strategic Response Group (SRG).

SRG is comprised of a versatile team of deputies charged with targeting quality-of-life concerns and safety needs of communities across Broome County.

The specialized team of one sergeant and three deputies focus primarily on community concerns that may not be adequately addressed or not addressed in a timely manner due to high volume of calls for service for normal patrol deputies.

Utilizing statistical and crime-mapping data from the Southern Tier Crime Analysis Center in Binghamton, SRG is able to identify reoccurring issues and activity, or "hot spots" in communities throughout Broome County.

These quality-of-life issues include, but are not limited to:

- Areas with a high numbers of speeding vehicles or repeat traffic complaints;
- Frequent or repeated narcotic activities
- Persistent or complex calls that require greater intervention and solutions;
- Susceptible facility or building checks to prevent property crimes;
- Intervention techniques with persistent criminal offenders;



- Collaboration with community partners to intervene with individuals with substance use disorders;
- Engagement with homeless persons and connecting with services; and
- Targeted enforcement of high crime areas, especially those experiencing gun and gang-related violence.

#### STRATEGIC RESPONSE GROUP

In addition to statistical crime data, SRG will utilize input from community members, collaboration with community partners, and tips from the community to deploy resources efficiently and effectively to address these issues through a variety of techniques, intervention, and enforcement.

Through flexible scheduling, the SRG can operate at different times of day depending on community needs.



The SRG's activities are designed to reduce the calls for service for traditional zone patrol deputies, allowing them to handle criminal complaints, 911 calls and an overall increase response time to emergencies.

#### **CANINE UNIT**

The Sheriff's Office Canine Unit falls under the Sheriff's Office Patrol Division and is comprised of three canine teams: Sgt. Holden/K9 Raven, Deputy Louden/K9 Cash, and Deputy Williams/K9 Titus. Each dog is handled by a trained and DCJS certified canine handler. Certifications for police patrol include certifications in area searches, building searches, tracking, article/evidence searches, and suspect apprehension. Additional specialized certifications in scent detection include narcotic scent detection and explosive scent detection.







In 2024, the Broome County Sheriff's Canine Unit had 70 deployments assisting members of the Sheriff's Office and other local agencies with narcotic detection, bomb sweeps, evidence searches, and tracking fleeing and vulnerable persons. Additionally, they have assisted the Southern Tier Swat Team by maintaining a perimeter for high-risk warrant executions.



#### **CANINE UNIT**

**K9 Raven** is a three-year-old female German Shepard and is trained police patrol and narcotic scent detection. 2024 was K9 Raven's first fullyear on patrol and she was deployed 50 times throughout the year assisting members of the Broome County Sheriff's Office and many other local law enforcement agencies.





**K9 Cash** is a three-year-old male German Shepard and is training in police patrol and explosive scent detection. Deputy Louden and K9 Cash completed a 10 ten-week K9 school at Cedar Creek Kennels in Illinois. They successfully completed their certification as a K9 team in June 2024, and were deployed 15 times since they became certified.

**Deputy Williams and Kg Titus** joined the Broome County Sheriff's Office in August 2024. They were already a certified Kg team when they join the Broome County Sheriff's Office. Kg Titus is a six-year-old male Belgian Malinois trained in narcotic scent detection and tracking. Kg Titus was deployed 5 times from September-December 2024.




#### **HONOR GUARD**



The Broome County Sheriff's Office Honor Guard detail is led by one Sergeant, and a few select hand-picked Deputies. The Honor Guard's primary duties include funeral honors for fallen and retired officers and to serve as Guardians of the Colors by displaying and escorting the National Flag during ceremonial events.

Events attended by the Sheriff's Office Honor Guard for the year 2024 include National Police Week ceremonies 09/11 World Trade Center Remembrances and the annual Crime Victim's tribute. The Honor Guard also participates in several parades each year, most notable the annual St. Patrick's Day Parade in Binghamton and the local Hillcrest Parade.

The uniform worn by the Honor Guard is the "class A" formal dress blouse with a gold shoulder cord and Sam Browne shoulder rig with attached duty belt, trousers, shined shoes and the Stetson hat.



#### **MOTOR UNIT**

The Broome County Sheriff's Office Motorcycle Unit is comprised of eight members who have completed an intensive training school. The Motor Unit is primarily used for traffic enforcement, escorts, and ceremonial events. The Motor Unit consists of two 2021 model Harley Davidson Police Electra Glides.

The Broome County Sheriff's Office Motor Unit was active in the community throughout the year. The Motor Unit was utilized in many community events during 2023 to include The Spiedie Fest, The Broome County Special Olympics, The Special Olympics Summer Games in Ithaca, NY, local National Police Week events, The Twin Tiers Honor Flight, National Night Out, and numerous other details such as holiday parades and community civic sporting parades.



#### MARINE PATROL UNIT





**The Marine Unit** is comprised of one Sergeants and nine deputies who are responsible for the enforcement of boating safety regulations as well as conducting search, rescue, and recovery operations. Deputies assigned to the Marine Unit are also responsible for the verification of Hull Identification Number for registration purposes.


The unit utilizes four boats to patrol the waterways of Broome County. The primary craft is an 18-foot American Airboat "Air Ranger" boat. The Marine Unit also has a 16-foot Defender inflatable rescue boat powered by a 30 horsepower Evinrude engine, another 14-foot inflatable rescue boat with a 25 horsepower Mercury engine, and a 14-foot Grumman aluminum boat powered by a 25 horsepower Evinrude engine.


The Marine Unit participated in multiple training exercises this year to maintain the ability to respond quickly to any water-based emergency. Training consisted of classroom instruction as well as boat operations and water rescue techniques in various locations from the Susquehanna River to the Whitney Point Reservoir.


#### **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT TEAM**

#### BACK TO SCHOOL BACKPACK GIVEAWAY



In less than two hours, local Broome County families received over 100 free backpacks full of school supplies donated by community members and our community partners, including BAE Systems, Wal-Mart, Staples, Sam's Club, BJ's Wholesale Club, Target and others.



In 2024, the Broome County Sheriff's Office partnered with the Blue Sisters Motorcycle Club and the Blue Brothers Law Enforcement Motorcycle Club for the first annual Back to School Backpack Giveaway, to provide free school supplies for local families in need of a little extra help for the coming school year.



Attendees also received free ice cream cones from the event's host, Big Dipper BBQ 2 in Conklin, NY.



#### **NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH PROGRAMS**

The Broome County Sheriff's Office continues to work with the citizens within the County, helping them establish Neighborhood Watch groups.

This program encourages citizens to be active within their neighborhood in preventing crime and assisting the police by being good observers in the community. The Broome County Sheriff's Office is still at a total of 29 Neighborhood Watch groups. The Sheriff's Office is directly linked to the National Neighborhood Watch, which is associated with the National Sheriff's Association.

The Sheriff's Office also participates in National Night Out, which promotes neighborhood safety and anti-crime issues. Neighborhood Watch Groups have also joined private social media groups to share important information about crime prevention and current issues in their communities.







## BUSINESS SAFETY & SECURITY

The community policing has established a detailed Safety & Security checklist for local businesses within Broome County. The checklist was made available on the website and is free to all businesses in the county.

#### **PUBLIC SAFETY TOWN HALLS**



In 2024, the Broome County Sheriff's Office continued its efforts to hold multiple Public Safety Town Halls across Broome County, where community members were invited to hear the latest updates on policy and programs from the BCSO and to discuss pressing public safety issues in their individuals communities and neighborhoods.

Whether the meetings were attended by 75 community members or 7, it was essential for members of the Broome County Sheriff's Office Law Enforcement and Corrections Divisions to meet directly with members of the public to hear and share their experiences and perspective on how we can continue to keep Broome County's families safe.



#### **BROOME SHERIFF'S MOBILE APP**



The Broome County Sheriff's Office continued utilizing its free Mobile App to help keep the members of the public more informed on the day-to-day activities of the BCSO than ever before.

Since launch in 2023, our app has been downloaded by over 21,000 users, and is opened an average of 375,000 times per week.

The app is designed to improve communication between law enforcement and the community through a variety of features, ranging from providing up-to-the-minute public information updates to ways for families and loved ones to communicate with inmates at the Broome County Correctional Facility. features a wide variety of features ranging from providing public information to ways for families to communicate with inmates at the Broome County Correctional Facility.

#### **SENIOR SAFETY**

During 2024 the community policing division educated senior groups on the issues of telemarketing fraud, investment scams, auto safety, and theft prevention. Programs were offered at local senior centers and deputies also attended several area senior picnics that were hosted by the Broome County Office of the Aging. These senior picnics allowed for a more personal relationship between area seniors and deputies. Many donations from area businesses provided the opportunity for the Sheriff's Office to purchase several hundred "Senior Safe" pamphlets that were distributed to various seniors in Broome County.








# YELLOW DOT PROGRAM

The Sheriff's Office paired up with the New York State Sheriffs' Association and started the Yellow DOT Program in Broome County. Working hand in hand with the Office for Aging, the Department of Health, and the NYS Sheriff's Association, the Sheriff's Office was able to distribute several thousand Yellow DOT stickers/packets to Broome County residents. The Yellow DOT is a decal that is placed on a driver's vehicle to indicate that the driver's vital medical information is contained within the glove compartment. The personal information is contained in a yellow folder for use in the event of an emergency. The Yellow DOT Program is 100% free and provided by the NYS Sheriff's Association.

#### CARFIT AND SAFETY INSPECTIONS



In addition to Presentations and senior picnics, Both Community Engagement team members are CARFIT certified. Carfit is a communitybased educational program that allows older drivers to assess how they "fit" in their vehicles.

It provides safety information and raises awareness of resources such as adaptive devices, that can help drivers become more comfortable and confident behind the wheel. Its primary purpose is to educate drivers and share safety information.

Carfit is administered with the assistance of AA, AARP, And the American Occupational Therapy Association.

# CHILD SAFETY SEAT INSPECTIONS

Both Members of the Community Engagement team hold a nation certification in the installation of child seats. This national certification ensures that parents and caregivers are using child restraints that are appropriate for the children who use them, and that the seats are properly, and safely installed in vehicles.

The program provides information, and hands on training for caregivers, and is run in collaboration with the Broome County Health department.



#### PROJECT SAFE CHILD

In 2024, The Broome County Sheriff's Office continued Project Safe Child, a free service that allows parents to create custom cards with their children's biographical information, digital photo and digital fingerprints for the parents or legal guardians of a child.

The information is then stored in the Missing and Exploited Children's Clearing House database. If the child goes missing, the information can be quickly accessed by law enforcement and put out on the Amber Alert System..



#### PROJECT LIFESAVER



In 2024, The Broome County Sheriff's Office continued the Project Lifesaver Program. Project Lifesaver consists of members of the Sheriff's Office and the Vestal Police Department, who are specially trained with equipment that assists in finding missing people, especially those with certain ailments, such as Alzheimer's, Dementia, Traumatic Brain Injury, Downs Syndrome, and Autism. These ailments frequently play a role in those afflicted having a higher risk of wandering, increasing the possibility of injury, illness, exposure, and life-threatening situations. Families or caregivers of 'Clients' apply through the Sheriff's Office, and, if approved, receive a special bracelet that is fitted with a radio transmitter. The transmitter has a specific assigned frequency for each Client. The specific frequency can be traced by a receiver, operated by a trained deputy sheriff. Each family receives training on how to use the bracelet and what to do if their loved one is missing. Most N.Y.S. Sheriff's Offices currently participate in this program.

#### **BLUE ENVELOPE PROGRAM**



In 2024, The Broome County Sheriff's Office launched the Blue Envelope Program, a first-in-New-York-State initiative aimed at creating a safer, more understanding environment for interactions between law enforcement and individuals and families with autism.

Being pulled over by a police officer can make anyone anxious. For somene with Autism Spectrum Disorder, it can cause an even greater issue, between the heightened situation, the flashing lights, the sounds of radios and other noises.

The Blue Envelope Program is designed to help ease communication and prevent misunderstandings between individuals with autism and law enforcement during traffic stops or during an emergency.

Participating individuals and their families are given a blue envelope, insert card and Blue Envelope Program vehicle sticker. Outside of the envelope contains instructions for the driver, like keeping hands on the wheel, the officer may shine their flashlight in the car and the police car may have flashing lights. The envelope also tells the officers what to do, like simplifying requests and if the driver becomes upset and whether the driver/passenger is verbal/nonverbal. Inside the envelope is a fillable insert card containing emergency contact information.

When someone with autism is pulled over, the sticker helps inform the officer that either the driver or the passenger has autism and might need additional assistance or understanding for a successful interaction. The driver can provide the officer with the blue envelope containing their driver's license, vehicle registration, vehicle insurance, and an emergency contact card inside.



#### PINK PATCH PROJECT



For the second year in a row, the men and women of the Broome County Sheriff's Corrections Officers and Deputies went pink during Breast Cancer Awareness Month as part of the Pink Patch Project to support local families fighting cancer.

Corrections Officer and Pink Patch Project Organizer Jennifer McPeek had been helping several members of her family fight breast cancer for nearly 20 years, and in 2023, she recruited the Broome County Sheriff's Office to help join the fight with the Pink Patch Project.


In 2024, the BCSO held a logo design contest for that year's t-shirts, and community member Erin Hagerman designed the winning logo.

Throughout October 2024, over 80 members of the Broome County Sheriff's Corrections and Road Patrol divisions sported pink badges and patches and helping raise funds for local families battling cancer. Community members joined the effort, purchasing t-shirts, sweatshirts, patches, and other items. All proceeds went to the Traci's Hope, a local organization that supports local families fighting breast cancer by assisting with groceries, childcare or other expenses related to the fight against cancer. To date, McPeek and the Pink Patch Project have raised over \$7,200 for local families through contributions and sales of patches, badges and other custom merchandise.



#### **DETECTIVE DIVISION**

The Broome County Sheriff's Detective Division is comprised of one Lieutenant, two Detective Sergeants, 11 detectives, two deputies, one correctional officer and one civilian. The law enforcement Captain oversees the division. Units that fall under the detective division are general investigations, special investigations, juvenile investigations, the warrant unit, field intelligence officer and the evidence/property room. Members assigned to the detective division maintain the sex offender registry and evidence/property room control. They are assigned to the G.I.V.E. 



OffenderWatch® is updated throughout the day as offender addresses and other reportable offender information is received. You may enter any address in the County and see real-time information on the offenders within the specified radius of the address you enter. You may register as many addresses in the County as you wish, and we will continuously monitor the addresses and send an email alert if a new offender registers an address within the specified radius of



the address you register. There is no cost for this service and no limit to the number of addresses you can register - your email address and physical addresses are all confidential.

### **WARRANT UNIT**

**The Warrant Control Unit** of the Broome County Sheriff's Office is comprised of two, (2) deputy sheriffs under the direction of the Detective Sergeant assigned to General Investigations.

The unit is responsible for the management of warrants issued to the Broome County Sheriff's Office by Broome County Supreme Court, Broome County Family Court and local Justice Courts throughout Broome County. The deputies assigned to the unit ensure entry of each warrant received into the Broome County Public Safety System and eJusticeNY (The New York State Integrated Justice Portal). This helps to readily identify wanted persons who may be encountered by Police Officers locally or nationwide.

The Broome County Sheriff's Office continues to work with New York/New Jersey Regional Fugitive Task Force. Six Sheriff's Office members are sworn United States Deputy Marshals. They work along with members of the Marshal Service, Binghamton Police Department and New York State Police. The Regional Fugitive Task Force increases the resources available to better track fugitives not only in New York State but across the country.


In addition to New York State, the Unit is responsible for the extradition of wanted subjects that are located outside New York State.



## 2024 DETECTIVE NOTABLE CASES

#### Broome County Sheriff's Office Case #24-11867, #24-11868, and 24-11988

#### Suspect in Multiple Robberies Located and Arrested

During the early morning hours of *May 9th*, *2024*, members of the Broome County Sheriff's Office patrol division, responded to 871 Route 7 in the Town of Colesville and 648 Old Route 17 in the Town of Windsor for two separate robbery complaints. Patrols determined that during both incidents, property was forcefully stolen from both locations.

Detectives used information provided by patrols and developed suspect vehicle information and determined that *Clint A. Loomis*, *age 46 of Kirkwood*, *NY*, was a person of interest in the case. During the evening hours of May 9th, patrols located our suspect vehicle fleeing from a third robbery location on Route 12 in Chenango County. After a pursuit due to a failure to comply, Clint Loomis was taken into custody in the Town of Kirkwood.

As result of these case investigations, Clint A. Loomis was charged with two counts of Robbery in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Degree, Class D Felonies and multiple Vehicle and Traffic Law Violations.

#### **Broome County Sheriff's Office Case #24-1069**

#### Two Suspects Arrested After Fleeing Scene of Fatal Motor Vehicle Accident

On September 15th, 2024, the Broome County Sheriff's Office Uniformed Patrols responded to Morgan Rd. in the Town of Binghamton, for report of a fatal motor vehicle accident. Upon patrols arrival, the operator of one of the vehicles involved in the MVA, Cody W. Diffendorf, age 20 of Kirkwood, NY, was on-scene with a passenger that was in his vehicle. The operator of the second vehicle, later identied as James M. MacDowall, age 20 of Binghamton, NY, fled the scene on foot and the passenger of that vehicle, identified as Charles Burrell was located deceased on scene.

During interviews with parties involved in the accident, detectives learned that there was an on-going dispute that was reoccurring between Cody W. Diffendorf and James M. MacDowall. On the night of the MVA, detectives determined that both Cody W. Diffendorf and James M. MacDowall acted recklessly while operating their motor vehicles and subsequently caused the death of Charles Burrell.

As result of this investigation, Cody W. Diffendorf and James M. MacDowall were charged with one count each of Manslaughter in the Second Degree, Class C Felonies.

# BROOME COUNTY SPECIAL INVESTIGATIONS UNIT TASK FORCE



#### **Mission**

The Broome County Special Investigations Unit Task Force is a is a multi-jurisdictional task force primarily committed to the suppression of illegal and illicit drugs within Broome County. The Task Force actively pursues those individuals or groups who manufacture, distribute or sell illegal drugs within the jurisdictional boundaries of Broome County. In addition, the Task Force focuses on enforcing laws related to illegal firearms, prostitution, and Alcoholic Beverage Control Laws of the State of New York. The Task Force also conducts special operations including, but not limited to, homicides, extortion, robbery, larcenies, and counterfeit cases.

The Broome County Special Investigations Unit Task Force is comprised of sworn law enforcement officers from the Broome County Sheriff's Office, City of Binghamton Police Department, and the Village of Johnson City Police Department.

# BROOME COUNTY SIU TASK FORCE GOALS & OBJECTIVES

#### **Analysis of 2024 Goals and Objectives**

*In 2024*, the Broome County Special Investigations Unit Task Force continued targeting narcotics activity utilizing available resources. Some new equipment was purchased to improve investigatory skills. Training sessions were utilized to improve investigative techniques and we were able to send multiple Detectives/Investigators to schools to increase their knowledge base and skill level. The Broome County Special Investigations Unit use of informants remained steady throughout the year and has proven valuable to the unit.

Overall, the production of the Broome County Special Investigations Unit increased from the previous year. The number of arrests went up as well as the number of firearms seized. The number of total search warrants was lower due to the fact that members of the task force conducted more street level interdiction in 2024 and especially the BCSIUTF now has an investigator assigned to conduct street level interdiction.

#### Goals for 2025

The Broome County Special Investigations Unit Task Force takes pride in the work done for the residents of Broome County and the success they have had in 2024. They will strive to continue targeting narcotics activity and seek to significantly reduce, and otherwise adversely impact narcotics trafficking and narcotics smuggling operations, as well as reducing drug related violence and other associated crimes using said training and equipment.

*In 2025*, the Broome County Special Investigations Unit Task Force seeks to stay up to date on all investigative techniques through research and training, as well as have the most upto-date equipment to better target narcotics activity and keep team members safe during operations. With up-to-date equipment, the BCSIUTF can improve their investigative techniques and target narcotics activity from multiple dimensions.

The utilization of confidential sources and tips from the community are vital ways to combat narcotics activity. The Broome County Special Investigations Unit seeks to continue building the use of confidential sources and seeks to act upon tips provided from the community regarding narcotic activity.

The utilization and training of patrol officers and other specialized unit officers in the development of potential confidential informants that can be used by the members of the Broome County Special Investigations Unit task force.







## 2022/2023 STATISTICAL COMPARISON






## 2022-2024 CURRENCY SEIZED

#### **SOUTHERN TIER SWAT TEAM**





**The Southern Tier SWAT Team** is a highly trained and skilled tactical team used as a resource for the Broome County Sheriff's Office, the Endicott Police Department and the Chenango County Sheriff's Office in the handling of critical incidents. The Southern Tier SWAT Team responds to situations such as, but not limited to, active shooter incidents, hostage taking, barricaded suspect(s), sniper incidents, high risk apprehension(s), high risk warrant service, personal protection details, diplomatic security details, high risk prisoner transport, civil disturbances, special assignments, and any other situation at the request of the Broome County Sheriff, the Endicott Police Chief, and/or the Chenango County Sheriff.

It is the mission of the Southern Tier SWAT team to support the Broome County Sheriff's Office, Chenango County Sheriff's Office, the Endicott Police Department, and any other Law Enforcement agency with a need for tactical response to critical incidents. The Southern Tier SWAT team is comprised of members from the Broome County Sheriff's Office, Chenango County Sheriff's Office, and the Endicott Police Department. There are a total of 29 Members on the team, 18 members from the Broome County Sheriff's Office, 4 members from the Endicott Police Department, 4 members from the Chenango County Sheriff's Office and 3 civilian Paramedics/EMT's assigned as Tactical EMS personnel.

The Southern Tier SWAT team was certified by the Division of Criminal Justice Services in 2020 and the team continues to strive to meet the certification requirements through training and physical fitness.



### **SOUTHERN TIER SWAT TEAM**

In 2024 the Southern Tier SWAT Team and personnel were utilized in multiple situations. A few of the situations that the entire team or a portion of the team were utilized in are as follows:

- The team was requested by the US Marshal's Fugitive Task Force to assist in the capture of Daziar Gadson. Daziar had an active Arrest Warrant out of Broome County Court for Attempted Murder. The SWAT team executed a Surround and Call Out on the residence where Gadson was supposedly hiding. Information was gathered at this scene that Gadson had just left and was currently at another location nearby. SWAT executed another Surround and Call Out and Gadson was taken into custody without incident.
- Members of the Southern Tier SWAT team assisted the Madison County Sheriff's Office with the apprehension of Michael DeBottis who had an active arrest warrant out of Broome County. DeBottis had fled from a traffic stop in Madison County the previous day. When approaching his residence DeBottis rammed the Madison County Bearcat Armored Vehicle with a large tractor equipped with a front-end loader. He then fled into the woods on said tractor. Broome County SWAT led a tracking element into the woods to follow DeBottis. He was taken into custody soon thereafter with the assistance of Onondaga County Sheriff's Office Aviation Unit.

The Broome County Sheriff's Law Enforcement Academy is regarded as a premier New York State Basic Police Officer Academy. We utilize instructors from many different agencies and disciplines that instruct at the Academy. The Academy is a para-military fashion and provides more certifications than most of the Academies in New York State, while maintaining a very low cost for attendance. The 2024 Academy consisted of 1,184 hours of training. 34 recruits from 12 different agencies graduated from this years' police academy. Because of our ongoing positive relationship with the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services, most of the training was conducted at no cost. The training division regularly receives compliments by their staff, as well as instructors and visitors participating in the DCJS training. The training division is comprised of one full time Highway Patrol Lieutenant and many part-time instructors from various agencies.

# BROOME COUNTY CORRECTIONS ACADEMY

The Broome County Sheriff's Law Enforcement Training Division is also the home to the Broome County Sheriff's Corrections Academy. Because of the recent efforts in recruiting by the Sheriff's Office, the Corrections Academy was able to accept recruits from other agencies and had one the largest classes in its history. Twenty-one new Officers, seventeen of which were from Broome County, graduated.

In addition to maintaining New York State mandates with over 4000 hours of training, the Corrections Academy has also conducted many new training opportunities to further increase the competence of the veteran staff. These opportunities included courses in Interview and Interrogation for Corrections investigators, supervisory liability training, Field Training Officer courses, weapon armorer courses, gang conferences, as well as others. After increasing the level of competence of Corrections staff in 2023, the focus for 2024 was to raise the performance level of staff to the point where they are an example for other jails throughout New York State. This investment in training reflects Sheriff Akshar's effort to provide the best quality facility for the public, the staff, as well as the incarcerated.

Throughout the last several years, major legislative changes have been made, affecting the day-to-day operations within the Correctional system. These changes have required Correctional facilities to adapt and create new ways of managing the incarcerated.

Our facility continues to adapt to the needs of the community by processing arrestees through our Central Arraignment Program. Similarly, the Humane Alternatives to Long-Term solitary confinement Act (HALT) changes have now settled into what the new environment of corrections looks like.

This legislation, along with the public's view of corrections and law enforcement as a whole, is requiring a higher level of accountability and efficiency regarding the higher proportion of tax dollars committed to keeping our community and facilities safe and secure.

With this mindset in view, our leadership has dedicated itself to revitalizing the Sheriff's Office mission and vision to better serve our community.

Our facility continues to operate as the Central Arraignment center. Central Arraignment has streamlined procedures allowing police officers to leave detainees at the facility and return to their posts in the community. This continues to be important due to constantly changing bail reform laws.



Once admitted to the facility, corrections staff now detain the individuals' pending arraignments that are held at the facility twice per day. In 2024 Corrections Officers aided in the arraignment of roughly 2,316 CAP cases involving 1,738 detainees through 663 arraignment sessions with at least 1 CAP inmate was arraigned. Of those detainees, 1,308 were released, 619 were given bail, 389 were remanded without bail. The Corrections department has also processed and responded to 179 requests for information under the Freedom of Information Law (FOIL).

# Support and Education Programs for Incarcerated Individuals

In 2023, Sheriff Akshar prioritized the reimplementation and expansion of programming opportunities, restoring and adding over 30 hours of weekly support and educational programming opportunities available to incarcerated individuals in the first months of the new administration.

That trend continued in 2024 through partnerships with community organizations, including the Broome County Council of Churches, Mothers and Babies Perinatal Network, the Addiction Center of Broome County, Rise




Domestic Violence Services, Cornell Cooperative Extension Broome County, Inside Out Network, League of Women Voters and more. Programs include, but are not limited to:

- The interfaith Jail Ministry Program, run by the Broome County Council of Churches provides opportunities for worship, Counseling, education, and support for inmates.
   Offers services and support to ex-offenders returning to community from prison or jail.
   The program includes religious services for a variety of denominations, including non-denominational services, pastoral visits and interfaith one-on-one meetings.

- Family Literacy
- Relationship Group/Marriage Counseling
- Alcoholics Anonymous
- Narcotics Anonymous
- Mothers and Babies parenting classes, sex education and assistance to incarcerated pregnant mothers

#### Reentry Reform Advisory Group

First cvened in Decemver of 2022, the Broome County Sheriff's Reentry Reform Advisory Group consists of local healthcare, workforce and social service professionals, advocates and previously incarcerated individuals. The Advisory Group meets monthly with the Sheriff and Correctional Facility staff to discuss, identify and find solutions for issues involving the incarcerated population currently in the Correctional Facility as well as those returning to the community.

#### L.E.A.R.N. Digital Learning Initiative





In 2024, the BCSO continued its L.E.A.R.N. (Life Skills, Education and Accountability for Reentry Navigation) program, which provides over 60 hours of education, self improvement and workforce development training on each incarcerated individual's tablet.

Incarcerated individuals have access to courses during daytime hours and throughout the night, along with over 10,000 book titles available on each tablet.

Since November 2023, over 1,110 incarcerated individuals have completed over 21,553 training courses.

#### **Expanded Correctional Facility Garden**



In 2024, the Broome County Sheriff's Office continued our partnership with with Cornell Cooperative Extension (CCE) to provide introduce gardening classes and horticultural instruction and experience for incarcerated individuals in a secure, but previously unused green space within the Correctional Facility.

The Correctional Facility Community Garden enables inmates to spend more time outside learning valuabel skills to take with them when they return to the community.

Members of the Carpenters Local 277, along with several students and apprentices, volunteered their time to construct 9 additional garden beds with materials donated by Bowman Lumber.

Master Gardeners from CCE Broome County oversaw the planting of seeds and starter plants donated by local stores like Home Depot, Lowe's and Agway.

Over in 2024, dozens of crates of fresh vegetables were grown and donated to the CHOW food pantry

We look forward to continuing to grow and expand this program with our many community partners for years to come.



## **INMATE TRANSPORTS**



The Transportation Unit handles the court calendar managed by the Sheriff's Office. The unit transports inmates to all county, family, city, parole hearings, federal courts, court ordered transfers to rehabilitation facilities and medical transports. Medical transports include trips to hospitals, private physicians and outside of the facility dental consultations. Every inmate sentenced to state prison is also transported by this unit. This unit continues to have the responsibility of conducting all appearances held virtually.

#### MEDICAL SERVICES



**The Health Services Unit** of the Correctional Facility uses an all-inclusive approach combining both medical and mental health services to provide the highest quality care to the population served. PrimeCare Medical, P.C. was contracted to provide these services beginning February 1, 2022 and continued to be contracted throughout 2023. The facilities health care team continues to meet the demands of the inmate population while containing costs and maintaining standards set forth by accrediting agencies.

The demands of excellence required by the Sheriff's Office have been met throughout the year by the Health Services Unit. The Medical Unit, as well as the Mental Health Unit are accredited by the National Commission on Correctional Health Care (NCCHC). NCCHC is a private, not-for-profit organization that grants public recognition to correctional institutions that meet nationally accepted standards for providing health care services. Through the accreditation process, NCCHC conducts on-site surveys and evaluation of all aspects of health services provided. It is through this rigorous process that NCCHC determines and renders professional judgement required to be identified as a NCCHC Accredited Facility. The following is a statistical breakdown of services provided.

### MEDICAL SERVICES

## Ensuring Incarcerated Individuals Receive the Medically Assited Treatment (MAT) They Need

In 2024, the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility continued weekly medical treatment meetings with Command Staff and Medical, Mental Health and SUD treatment providers to review cases and resolve issues.

Our Forensic Services Program Coordinator (FSPC) was added analyze the needs of the inmate population, requirements of state regulations and compare them to services currently provided by contracted medical providers. The FSPC examines workflows, barriers to treatment both during incarceration and at time of release, identifying highest needs and where resources must be allocated.

Any inmate entering the facility seeking MAT can receive it. After incarceration, inmates are reassessed to ensure those who initially refused treatment have another chance to enter the program. The facility's treatment provider worked to hire additional staff to perform regular assessments for inmates for changes to current prescription or late entry into the MAT program. Before every discharge, scheduled or not, all inmates are assessed and connected to the appropriate continuity of MAT care before leaving the facility.

Our facilities medical department continues to provide opioid overdose prevention training and treatment for inmates. If an inmate has a history of using opioids like heroin, fentanyl, and prescription medications, they will be offered training on how to use an overdose prevention kit. Every inmate released from custody is provided with an overdose prevention kit. This training program is tailored to individuals in need of education on the opioid epidemic and the protentional for overdose with the goal of prevention and intervention.

The Sheriff's Office continued to provide our Medically Assisted Treatment (MAT) program in 2024. This program offered medication assisted treatment for Opioid Use Disorder (OUD). Upon initial intake in our facility, each inmate is medically screened for the presence of an OUD. If an individual has an OUD, then this program is made available to them. Opioid overdose prevention and medication tapers are offered to all individuals with an identified OUD. The maintenance program for OUD is offered to all individuals in need throughout their incarceration at the facility. In 2024, our medical department processed and admitted 609 individuals into the MAT program, more than tripling the admittance into the program from that of 2022.

### MEDICAL SERVICES

### **Medically Assited Treatment (cont.)**

The following steps are how the program works:

Opioid overdose prevention: For every person booked into the facility who is found to have an opioid use disorder, education on the use of an overdose prevention kit will be offered and prior to release each inmate is provided with a Narcan kit. Medication Assisted Treatment: Medication assisted treatment is broken down into three parts.

- Continuing of medication from the community: If a person is booked into the facility and has been taking Buprenorphine (Suboxone) or Methadone in the community, that medication will be continued while the person is incarcerated.
- 2. Medication Taper: For individual's booked into the facility who have an opioid use disorder who are not on Methadone or Buprenorphine (Suboxone) prior to incarceration, a medication taper will be offered to prevent the person from experiencing significant opioid withdrawal. If a person is released before the medication taper is complete, then a door to door treatment option will be offered to the individual.
- 3. Maintenance on Medication: If a person is sentenced to serve time in the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility and has an opioid use disorder, then the person will be seen by the addiction counseling team and they will be offered to participate in an ongoing maintenance with Buprenorphine (Suboxone) for the duration of their stay in the jail. This program has very specific requirements and each person must review each of these requirements and agree to them prior to starting their maintenance medication. It is also important that each person understand that if they violate treatment rules, they may be tapered off their medication and if they divert their medication to another person, they may face further legal charges in addition to being tapered off their medication.



### **Medically Assited Treatment (cont.)**

Our mission with each component of this program is to prevent the risk of overdose, to continue ongoing treatment, to prevent unnecessary suffering from withdrawal, to improve treatment engagement when a person is released from the facility and to reduce re-arrest for drug related crimes. We recognize the power of addiction and have developed this program to try to help lessen the impact of the disease on each person who suffers from it.

Our administration hired a new discharge planner that oversaw all the releases from the facility. Their role is to ensure everyone leaving the facility is connected to the services and programs they need to maintain a healthy lifestyle.

The discharge department created over 600 discharge plans for incarcerated individuals being released in 2024, more than double that of 2023. Heading into 2025, new re-entry advocates are planned to assist the discharge planners in their endeavors to advocate and connect those in need with the available resources we have in our community.

### **CORRECTIONS DIVISION**

### **Corrections Investigations Unit**

At the end of 2023, our Corrections Investigation Unit (CIU) had been greatly expanded to better ensure the safety of our Officers and the incarcerated. Our CIU department now has multiple full-time investigators, an Investigation Supervisor, and an Investigations K-9 unit, which included K-9 Marley. K-9 Marley has consistently assisted in multiple investigations, and his presence in Visitation has served as a successful deterrent and led to the banning of visitors when contraband was found on their person.

### **Gang Intelligence Unit**



Activated in January 2024, the Gang Intelligence Unit (GIU) is comprised of three primary members and has assisted nearly every law enforcement agency in the Southern Tier with criminal cases, providing crucial intelligence in dozens of court cases, and serving as the primary intelligence network for the area regarding gang crimes and activities.

GIU monitors and tracks gang and violent crime both in the community and within the Broome County Correctional Facility, often coordinating with other agencies, facilities and prosecuting organizations at the local, state and federal level to help drive down violent crime and drug activity.

# CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS UNIT CORRECTIONS DIVISION

**The Criminal Investigations Unit (CIU)** is a subunit of the Corrections Division, made up of select officers trained as investigators. These officers receive two weeks of criminal investigations training as well as periodic specialized training in areas that are relevant to their duties.

CIU is tasked with the responsibility of investigating any criminal activity that occurs within the Sheriff's Correctional Facility and the arrest and prosecution of the perpetrators. The unit also functions as an arm of Criminal Intelligence, assisting local Detective Divisions and other police agencies with relevant information for ongoing investigations or identification purposes.

### NOTABLE CIU CASES AND INVESTIGATIONS

### <u>Investigation Reveals Improvised Weapon and Threats of Violence</u>

On February 2, 2024 at approximately 2:45 PM, Corrections Officer Felo received information from undisclosed individual citing that an incarcerated individual housed in B-Pod of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility was concealing an improvised weapon on his person or in his individual cell.

An interview was conducted with this individual to obtain more information. In addition a sketch was able to be rendered of the object, as well as the identity of the individual concealing it.

Lt. Riley, Sgt.'s Wilcox and Fowler, along with Officers Pinney, Laskey, Joslin, Smith, Cafferty, and Investigators Debetta and Doyle responded to the housing unit and conducted a search of cell 118 which housed inmate Alixander Lavelle.

Upon entry into the cell, Lavelle was ordered to place his hands on his back, at which time Lavell aggressively postured from his bunk. Officers then were forced to restrain him on his bunk to secure him in handcuffs.

The improvised, edged weapon was discovered underneath his mattress. The improvised weapon was constructed from a portion of an optical lense frame and sharpened to a point.

The sharpened lense frame was then wrapped in plastic at the base. Phone calls from Lavelle obtained revealed numerous conversations about committing acts of violence within the facility and causing serious physical injury to others.

Following the investigation, Lavelle was charged with one (1) count of Promoting Prison Contraband in the 1st degree, violation of New York State Penal Law Section 205.25 Subsection 2, a Class D Felony.

### NOTABLE CIU INVESTIGATIONS

### **Contraband Located Following K9 - Assisted Investigation**

On February 23, 2024 at approximately 1:28 PM Sergeant Broughton, Investigator Debetta, Investigator Scczepanski, Investigator Doyle accompanied by K9 Marley, were conducting generalized searches in F-pod of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility when K9 Marley exhibited a distinct behavior change showing interest in cell 137 which was assigned to Marvin Greene.

Greene was secured in handcuffs and attempted to convince officers that the suspected contraband had been disposed of through the toilet. To verify the presence of contraband and maintain safe order and operation of the facility, a strip search was ordered. Upon initiating this search Greene became non-compliant and reached behind his person in the direction of his buttocks in attempts to further conceal what was in his possession. At this time officers attempted to gain control of his arm to obtain the item concealed within his hands however Greene became actively combative and was taken down on his bed to be restrained. Oleoresin-Capsicum was deployed to in order to gain compliance of Greene. Green was escorted to the facilities medial unit where he was to be decontaminated due to his exposure to a chemical agent, where he continued to make threats to officers regarding their safety. Handcuffs were removed so a proper strip search could be conducted to ensure the presence of contraband, at which time Greene took a bladed stance assuming an aggressive posture towards staff. Oleoresin-Capsicum was utilized once more to gain compliance of the individual. Greene was taken to the ground where he then dropped an object wrapped in black material, stating "here you got it".


Greene was secured in restraint chair for his own safety. Sgt. Broughton was then able to further inspect the suspected item dropped from Greene's possession. Upon further investigation the item appeared to be a condom containing a green leafy substance wrapped in a black outer material. The substance was then weighed and discovered to have an aggregate weight of thirty (30) grams. Utilizing the Nark II number 23 Synthetic Cannabinoid Reagent, which yielded a presumptive positive for the presence of synthetic cannabinoids.

Greene was charged with one (1) count of Promoting Prison Contraband in the 1st degree, violation of section 205.25 subsection 2, a Class D Felony. one (1) count of Tampering with Physical Evidence, a violation of New York State Penal Law Section 214.40, a Class E Felony, and one (1) count of Obstruction Governmental Administration, a violation of New York State Penal Law Section 195.05, a Class A Misdemeanor.

### **INMATE DISCIPLINARY PROCESS**

The position of hearing officer is vital to the safe and secure operation of the facility. The staff that makes up the team ranges from the line officer, the Programs Sergeant, Security Lieutenants, and the Jail Administrator. This structure provides for timely assessment of the inmate's actions along with lawful due process. Jails must be able to respond to an infraction of their rules quickly and decisively. Courts insist that the disciplinary process follow certain steps; it does not require courtroom-like formality. A process respected by both staff and inmates alike benefits the institution. The following charts represent the total hearings conducted and the disciplinary charges that inmates pled guilty to and waived their right to a formal discipline hearing.

### **INMATE GRIEVANCE PROGRAM**

In 2024, the Corrections Division continued the recently overhauled the greivance program, which added three levels of oversight to Inmate Requests and Grievances to ensure that all requests were properly recorded, reviewed and addressed.

Our Grievance Supervisor ensures that all requests are reviewed by a Receiving Officer, Supervisor and Command Staff to ensure accountability.

To provide an effective and impartial procedure for the timely resolution of inmate complaints, the chief administrative officer of each local correctional facility must establish, implement and maintain a formal inmate grievance program. Every effort shall be made to resolve inmate complaints in an informal manner.



The term "grievance" is defined as a written inmate complaint concerning either written or unwritten facility policies, procedures, rules, practices, programs or the action or inaction of any person within the facility. Dispositions, surcharges, and sanctions resulting from disciplinary hearings and administrative segregation housing decisions cannot be the subject of a grievance. The chief administrative officer or his designee ensures that each grievance is investigated to the extent necessary by an impartial person. Failure to supply sufficient information or evidence within two days shall be cause to deny the grievance. Grievances regarding dispositions or sanctions from disciplinary hearings, administrative segregation housing decisions, issues that are outside the authority of the chief administrative officer to control, or complaints pertaining to an inmate other than the inmate filing the grievance are not grievable and may be returned to the inmate by the grievance coordinator. Such grievances may not be appealed to the chief administrative officer or the Citizens' Policy and Complaint Review Council (Appeal to the Commission of Correction). A copy shall also be given to the members of the council for their review. If such determination is in favor of the grievant as a matter of law, the chairperson of the Citizens' Policy and Complaint Review Council shall direct the chief administrative officer to comply with the grievance and provide an appropriate remedy.



The Identification Division is responsible for the Maintenance of criminal records of the Broome County Sheriff's Office. The Division provides numerous services to the public as well. These services include fingerprinting for adoptions, permits, job applications, security clearances, issuance of personal identification cards, records check for several Broome County agencies, arson background checks for volunteer firefighters, registration of sex offenders within Broome County and the maintenance of the sex offender registry, Maintains & Supervise Central New York Live Scan Fingerprint database and submissions. Contained within the Identification Division is the Pistol Permit Office, which handles all aspects of issuance and maintenance of pistol permits for the public. This Division is staffed as follows:

**The Civil Division of the Broome County Sheriff's Office** is staffed by the following personnel:

- 1 Chief Civil Deputy
- 2 Deputy Sheriffs
- 1 Secretary
- 2 Keyboard Specialists

The Broome County Sheriff's Office Civil Enforcement Division is responsible for the enforcement of all civil processes in Broome County which include Summonses, Property Executions, Evictions, Income Executions, Subpoenas and other legal papers that require service. The Courts in Broome County and the surrounding counties depend on our Deputies to handle matters received from various towns, cities, Supreme, Surrogates and Family Courts. Our division often receives Orders of Protections, Summons and Petitions and other orders from all counties in New York and other states.

In the year 2024, the Civil Division processed 7,445 cases, which include 423 Summonses, 1,920 Evictions, and 1,398 Income Executions. The Family Court services include Neglect, Juvenile Delinquency cases, Support Petitions, Orders of Protection, Sexual Abuse petitions, modification hearings, and other kinds of orders and petitions that totaled 2,452 services. A more detailed breakdown of the services is included in this report.

Our office charges different fees for different services. The price to serve a summons/miscellaneous services is as low as \$20 and to serve and enforce an Eviction we charge a minimum of \$129. Services for Notice to Tenants in 2023 was 155, that greatly increased to 772 for 2024. I expect the increased number of services for Notice to Tenants to remain very high or possibly increase as many apartment complexes are re-managing their property and remodeling the areas. This 2024 increase is approximately \$20,000 for Broome County.


Our requests for service, eviction and court orders is staying steady and I do not see them decreasing.


Revenue brought in for services, fees, and poundage in 2024 was \$ 475,045, which is an increase of \$100,000. This money is turned over to Broome County as revenue. The Civil Division received \$1,992,921 for judgments and interest which was disbursed to attorneys and creditors, an increase of \$100,000.


When attempting to affect service, our Deputies spend vast amounts of time investigating and locating people to be served. Incorrect addresses, names and information are given to our office and it becomes a time-consuming process to search for the correct information. Often the Deputies must send inquires to local post offices or question friends, relatives, and neighbors to locate people or get new addresses. They will also investigate former employers to seek current information or research names using the computer and other resources that are available to them.


The Civil Enforcement Division handles Warrants of Evictions for Broome County. The process for enforcing an eviction can include the Deputies forcing entry, making arrests, finding assistance for tenants, contacting and arranging care for animals abandoned and overseeing the actual removal of a tenant's personal property. It also includes the enforcement of both the landlord and tenants' rights and seeing that proper procedures and laws are being followed. A Deputy may spend anywhere from one to eight hours or more on each eviction depending upon the situation.

The County Attorney's Office, Real Property Tax, The District Attorney's Office, the County Health Department, Support Collection, and the Department of Social Services seek the Civil Enforcement Division in processing and servicing their legal process and violation notices. These county offices also seek assistance regarding Civil Enforcement, Civil Procedure and Real Property laws.

### FISCAL OFFICE

**The Fiscal Office** is responsible for the financial management, accounting and reporting of the BC Sheriff operations.

The department staff includes:

- One Financial Services Administrator
- One Senior Account Clerk
- One Part Time Clerk.

The Fiscal Office performs many traditional financial functions for the Sheriff's Office including, but not limited to, the following major items:

- Budget Development In coordination with department heads, forecast and develop the Sheriff's Office annual operating and capital budgets and monitor financial activities to ensure compliance to the approved budgets. In 2024 operating budgets totaled approximately \$47.2 million.
- Pre- and Post-Award Grant Management Develop budgets that outline all project related costs. Maintain financial records, adhering to budget guidelines, and prepare financial reports. Recognized grant revenues for the year 2024 totaled approximately \$1.2 million.
- Payroll Process bi-weekly payroll and maintain payroll records of approximately 250 employees. In accordance with county policies and labor contracts; audit weekly timesheet, record attendance and leave data including overtime, shift premium, vacation and sick time. Calculate step increases, retirement payouts and retro pay.
   Process education bonuses, holiday and longevity and other stipends.
- Procurement and Contract Management Work together with the Legal and Purchasing departments to acquire goods and services in accordance with the county charter. Manage the ongoing administration of contracts, including renewals.
- Purchasing and Accounts Payable Process purchase requisitions and payment vouchers for general operating and grant activities. Maintain records for satisfaction of auditing purposes.

### FISCAL OFFICE

- Daily Cash Reconciliation Reconcile daily cash receipts and semi-monthly
  disbursements for garnishments and judgments processed by the Civil department,
  bail postings and fines. Maintain transaction records of pistol permits, identification,
  and record copies issued. In 2024, approximately \$2.9 million was received and \$2.3
  million was disbursed.
- Management of Inmate Fund Process disbursements of inmate funds. Funds received from or on behalf of inmates are deposited in inmates' commissary accounts to purchase personal commissary items during their time of confinement. In 2024, receipts totaled \$991,186 and disbursements totaled \$867,972.
- Management of Inmate Commissary Account. Commissions on commissary items purchased by inmates are placed in an Inmate Commissary Fund. Funds are restricted for the direct benefit of inmates, for items such as newspaper and magazine subscriptions, law books, recreational supplies, and cable television service. Commissions of \$208,390 and disbursements of \$170,251 were processed through the Inmate Commissary Fund in 2024.

### RECORDS DIVISION

The Records Division is responsible for the following functions:

- Reviewing and maintaining electronic and hard-copy records of all incident reports investigated by the Highway Patrol, Corrections and Detectives Divisions of the Broome County Sheriff's Office.
- Maintaining motor vehicle accident reports.
- Responding to requests for accident/incident information from the public, local courts, the District Attorney's Office, Department of Social Services, New York State Parole Office, and other law enforcement agencies.
- Monthly mandated reporting of incident activity to the New York Division of Criminal Justice Services using the Incident Based Reporting System.

One Discovery Technician, one Secretary and one Keyboard Specialist are currently assigned to the Records Division. Electronic incident records are maintained using the webbased Tyler Technologies Law Enforcement Records Management System (LERMS), which is shared with all other Broome County law enforcement agencies.

Motor vehicle accident reports are available through the Records Division for walk in requests at \$0.25 per page, or on-line at www.crashdocs.org for a fee. All other records can be requested through the Freedom of Information Law (FOIL) process either by contacting the Broome County Records Access Officer at 607-778-2287 or at www.gobroomecounty. com/foil to complete and submit a FOIL request.

In 2024, the Records Division responded to 992 FOIL requests. Additionally, the Records Division is responsible for issuing alarm permits to residents and businesses located within our jurisdiction who have alarm systems installed on their premises. This Division also maintains an accounting of all avoidable alarms occurring at these locations and provides billing as required. There is no fee for an alarm permit. Fees are charged, however, for excessive avoidable alarms within each calendar year. Total monies collected for various services conducted by the Records Division in 2024 was \$3,294.00 as follows:

- \$2,694.00 Collected directly by Records Division for copies of reports/photographs.
- \$600.00- Collected directly by Records Division for avoidable alarm fines.

In 2024, Broome County Sheriff's Office personnel recorded 33,693 Calls for Service, 227 Criminal Case seals and 716 Vehicle and Traffic ticket seals.
